FOUR WOUNDED IN HAZARD

Policeman May Die of Injuries Received in Battle

HAZARD, Ky., Dec. 4.—Alfred Holland, policeman, was shot and probably fatally wounded and Malcomb and Charles Wooten, brothers, received slight wounds in a pistol duel in North Hazard Sunday.

Holland, with Tom Davidson, another policeman, was patrolling the south side of the town when shots were heard in the north end. Arriving in that neighborhood they found the Wootens, who denied they had discharged firearms.

Holland decided to take them to jail on the charge of being intoxicated. Before they could be seized, however, according to statements made by Davidson, the Wootens began to shoot. Holland fell in the street at the first volley and emptied his gun at his assailants, each of whom was wounded in the side Malcomb Wooten's wife received a

ficsh wound when she attempted to shield her husband.

Holland was shot twice through the abdomen. Malcomb Wooten was formerly a deputy constable.

HAZARD PRISONERS ARE HELD IN FAYETTE JAIL

Enoch Polly, 40 years old, who is under life sentence for the murder of Monday Caudill, in Perry county, last July, and Malcolm B. Wooton, 23 years old, also of Perry county, who has been sentenced to 10 years in the state penitentiary in connection with the killing of police officers at Hazard last December, are being confined in the Fayette county jail here where they are awaiting an appeal for new trials.

Polly said that Caudill and another man brought liquor to his house and after luring him from his home attacked him, which later resulted in the fatal shooting. His case has been appealed on the grounds that four material witnesses were unable to appear at his trial. Wooton says that he shot in self defense when the officers entered his house and is appealing his case on the grounds that there were errors in the jury instructions and the verdict was not signed by the foreman.
